As I write this article, we are in the middle of Lent and the end seems a long ways off. Our passages for this season in Luke's Gospel have been highlighting the long, dry, treacherous, curvy and rough road of Lent. This road appears to resemble this winter's season that has seen so far a fairly dramatic range in relation to temperature and humidity.

I was telling a parishioner whom I was visiting last week about our pathway that leads to the entrance into the apartment building where Doug and I are living. This year's unpredictable weather pattern especially in terms of the water and ice accumulation resulted in two courses of

action for us: 1) we had to plan on taking more time to reach our destination (the entrance door) and 2) we needed to walk at certain places an alternate path that was more indirect in order to reach the (by now!) greatly desired door. Ahh, the inviting door that, once inside it, welcomes all who enter it with warmth plus the promise of a certain access to our respective apartment unit.

Our Readings in Luke's Gospel during this season of Lent have been particularly helpful to us as we have been

making our way through Lent. In our Sunday worship, we've been following the progress of Jesus' rather long Lenten journey with the disciples that started somewhere in Galilee and that will end in Jerusalem. On the map that's

St. Luke's Church invites you to participate in a traditional Seder Meal on Wednesday, **March 23** in Willard Hall, beginning at **6:00 p.m.** St. Luke's began holding Seders in 2006, as a way of acknowledging our common Jewish biblical roots.



The Seder is a ritual meal that celebrates the Jewish festival of Passover. Christians, whose traditions are rooted in Judaism, share the Passover experience of a people enslaved and then redeemed when God brought them to freedom, to covenant, to a Promised Land. Through the centuries the ritual of the Passover has allowed each generation of Jews to relive their history and make the story its own. Through the ritual found in this "Haggadah" (the book of readings for the Seder service), Jews and

Holy Week: A Pilgrimage Of Faith

Holy Week that signals the last stretch of our Lenten Journey will begin on the 20th of March, the Sunday of the Passion: Palm Sunday. At St. Luke's we invite you to take part in this life-changing journey as we join Jesus and the disciples for our Messiah's final week in the city of Jerusalem. With Jesus and the disciples this week, we are invited to participate in His final meal with the disciples in the upper room; to keep vigil as Jesus sends the night prayer; and then to follow Him as He is betrayed and then led away under false accusations to suffer death on a cruel cross. God's love for all humankind, thankfully, does not end in Jesus' death on the cross. We are invited to continue our journey as we go with the women to Jesus' tomb that stands empty.

The journey of Holy Week finds its culmination in The Great Vigil of Easter service where in darkness God's people gather in procession behind a single flame of light from a candle that will light our way until we see the True Light who is Jesus the Christ risen from the dead. Here it is where the solemnity of Lent and Holy Week are transformed by Christ's Resurrected glory into the joy of Easter that continues until all of us are drawn into God's Self as God's Community of Love in the world at Pentecost.

My prayer is that our path to God in this Season will continue to be blessed knowing that Christ walks with us every step of the way aiding and comforting us in our earthly endeavors. May our hearts be open to sharing in the grief and passion of our Lord so that we may also fully experience an overflow of joy knowing the salvation that is now ours thanks to Christ's victory over death at the Resurrection. —*Rev. 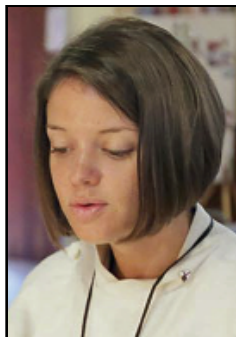
St. Luke's Church Choir

This begins a new series of articles that I plan to write this year, spotlighting some of the special lay ministries that are such an integral part of our St. Luke's community of faith. Our St. Luke's Choir has been so sensational that it became my number one choice to start out these profiles.



One only has to close ones eyes and listen to our gifted musician and choir director, **Ashley Paine**, with magic offers the preludes and postludes. Watching her fingers and then seeing her smile at her gifted singers just blows me away. Let's harvest some facts about why they perform like they do. Maybe it is their prayer together which touches me as well. In my questions to the members, the responses were joyful, starting with Ashley who joined us in January of 2015 and enjoys her members fully. "Always sing like no one can hear you." I used to put on my Walkman headphones and "sing" along to Mariah Carey's high notes. I thought I sounded just like her, but my mother and sister would tell you differently. Playing instruments was always my passion—piano and flute—but it was when I got involved with musicals in high school and the University Chorale in college that I realized I really loved to sing. In my career as an elementary music teacher, I love to sing with children. Her favorite piece today is "Come, Thou Font of Every Blessing."



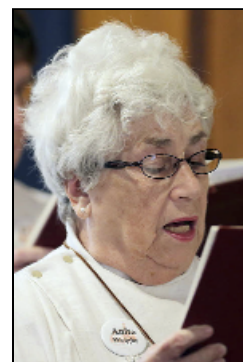
older brothers sang and played guitars, and she sang with them and they gave her a baritone uke when she was 12. There was a lot of music in their house. She named four favorite

hymns, the top being "Joyful, Joyful, We Adore Thee."



• **Chris Burchstead**, an alto, has sung in our choir for two years, but has sung in choirs and school choruses all her life. She loves to sing along with the radio while driving in the car. "Music is a universal language that makes people happy," says Chris. (Her sister, **Linda**, also an alto, sings beside her.) Linda shared that she sang at her sister's baptism. She believes she taught Chris how to sing! (I am just remembering our conversation.) Chris' favorite hymn is "Jerusalem."

• **Anita Wright** joined the team four years ago under Martha Stretton's reign. She began singing at age 14 in the Dutch Reformed Church choir in Newburgh, New York and sang in four different choral groups in high school and one in college. She sings with the Springfield Community Chorus. Favorite hymns "Abide With Me" and "Morning Has Broken." She thinks Ashley is a gift.



• Long-timer **Belinda Whipple Worth** believes her part-time involvement began about 25 years ago when she and her family joined St. Luke's. As a child she was in her elementary school glee club. She admitted she did not sing around the house much. When she did sing, her older brother would always say something like, "Shut up, songbird!"

Her grandmother, who was a nationally recognized voice teacher in Boston and president of the Singing Teachers of America for decades, advised me to NOT sing after she had me audition for her at the age of about 12. Today she loves singing in praise of God and to his glory and she says, "This desire has helped me to improve my singing over time." Gospel and Celtic hymns with a soulful theme are her favorites.



• Lest not forget **Pat Fromberger** who has been singing in an Episcopal church choir since she was 10 years old back in her hometown of Easton CT, so it was a natural progression to join the choir at St. Luke's (about 4 years after moving to Vermont in 1976.) Andrew G. Osmun was the Rector and Susan Klein was the

church musician and choir director. Historically at that time the choir had 16 members (10 women & 6 men)—an all time high! Music has always been a part of her life. Pat's oldest sister played the piano and was always getting her two younger sisters to sing with her. Music was a part of family gatherings, especially at Christmas. The family listened to lots of records and loved the musicals of the day, and Pat's mother would spontaneously break into song at a familiar word or phrase just as Pat does today. Music was also an important part of the curriculum in both elementary and high school. In college when she joined the chorus. Pat cannot pick just one favorite hymn, but "Holy, Holy, Holy! Lord God Almighty" and the anthem, "Deep Within" by David Haas, rank high on her list. Finally, Pat says, "I enjoy singing in a choir because it presents an opportunity to create a harmony of voices and it is both challenging and fun to sing various music arrangements. I love the special fellowship and bonding that results from a group of people singing together. For me it is also a spiritual experience and a way to praise the Lord—and at times a prayer."

So thank you for these special people with extraordinary gifts of singing and sharing. Keep it up!

***Editor's Footnote:** Linda Fawcett (Chris Burchstead's sister) has been a regular member of St. Luke's choir for three plus years, lending her strong alto voice to our blend of harmonies. Also not mentioned here, but nonetheless very appreciated, are those occasional members: Lillian and David Willis, Janet and Rick Hunter and John Hoover—who all share their musical talents during the seasons of Easter and Christmas and other special worship services.*

February Vestry Meeting Highlights

The Vestry met on February 1st with all ten members present. The meeting began with Treasurer Kathryn Wright reporting the good news that a successful January had put the church into the black for the month. The meeting then segued to maintenance and improvement projects and other regular agenda items.

• **Construction & Improvements:** Junior Warden, Andrew Pennell, is pursuing bids for various building projects, repairs, painting the church, and building a wheelchair ramp to replace the non-functioning handicapped-access elevator. These written bids are required for Kathryn's application for a Butterfield Loan from the Diocese. To increase lighting in the choir area, Andrew secured a bid that would change the overhead lights to modern LEDs

to save on electricity and power and, thereby, allow a new line from existing sources to the choir area. The Vestry approved spending up to \$1500 for the extension of wiring for track lighting that Andrew would donate, plus the new LED lights for overhead. The inconsistent front outside sensor light will be addressed when the other electric work is done. Andrew is also making a final decision on new computer for the outside office that will have publishing software, Excel, and the capability for management of the new website.

• **Rector's Report:** Heidi announced that the Worship Committee was officially reinstated as of January 30, 2016. She also said that she would be taking a two-week vacation after Easter. Plans will be forthcoming to deal with the worship services on April 3rd and April 10th—the Sundays Heidi will be away.

• **Focus Topic: Outreach:** Jane Davis distributed the list of the 2015 charities St. Luke's supports and also stressed the many different kinds of ministries supported by the church and parishioners. The list of those willing to drive fellow parishioners to necessary appointments needs to be updated. Janet Hunter will assume responsibility for being the parish contact person for the United Thank Offering—a job that Norm Harrison had previously done.

• **New Website:** The website is now live, and additions and corrections should be sent to Marti Assenza, who – with Lew and Bonnie Watters – worked with Springfield Tech students to create the site with minimal money and fuss. The Vestry approved thanking those involved at the school with a Visa gift card: \$100 to the teacher and lead student and \$50 to the other student who worked on the project.

• **Parochial Report:** Kathryn completed the factual report about attendance, etc., that determines our annual Parish Assessment. Accepted by the Vestry, the report was signed by the Secretary and submitted.

• **Parish Directory.** Pat Fromberger will create the 2016 version with updating help from Marti, Jean Hancock, and Janet Hunter. She hopes to have the booklet completed by the end of March.

• **Next Vestry Meeting:** March 7 with Maintenance as the Focus topic. —*Lillian Willis, Secretary/Clerk*

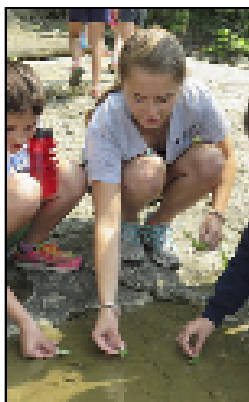

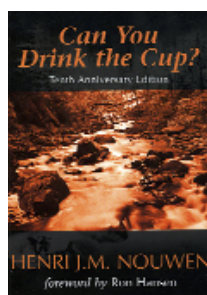

Pledges were very strong in January and we received our quarterly interest payment for the rectory sale. As a result, our income figure is 'way ahead of what we projected, and our bottom line ("Net Income") for the month is a very healthy \$3,878. Our expenses were significantly below budget, due to the continued decrease in the cost of oil and great stewardship in operating the Altar Guild, Communications and Worship. 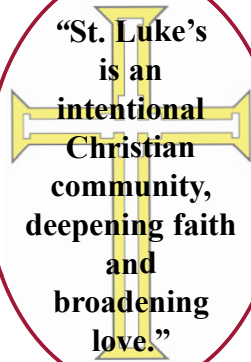
